- Questions and claims:
 - The existing world is not organized to ensure social protection, mobility or social solidarity for all. Instead, everything in this world is organized to ensure social division.
 - The world we live in and have always lived in is a world of mobility. There are many mobilities and many immobilities, and many of them are governed or shaped by nation state-regimes.
 - We understand the workshop to be a political intervention that is intended to have an impact on research agendas. We want to have an effect on our present and future.
 - o How do we organize human life and ensure social protection under the conditions of mobilities?

- Focus: Historical development of im/mobilities, social protection, solidarities and divisions
 - O How has "society" been defined and understood? (class, gender/sex, "race," "nation," and more)
 - o How has societal membership been defined and understood?
 - o How has "social protection" been defined and understood?
 - o How has mobility and immobility been organized? By whom? For whom?
 - o What are the linkages between social im/mobility and social solidarity or social divisions?

Day 2: Tuesday, September 27th

9:00-10:30 2nd Roundtable: "Beyond the Power of Citizenship: Mobility, Membership and Social Protection"

- **Focus**: A historically-reflective perspective that allows us to think of alternative ways of organizing political membership and social protection
 - What is the basis of societal membership today? What can it be? (i.e. why citizenship? Why
 "mothers" or "workers" or "the poor," etcetera?)
 - What is the source of social protection today? What can it be? (i.e. main differences between social protection and national welfare systems)
 - o Who are the recipients of social protection today? Who can it be?
 - How is social protection provided today? Whose labour goes into its provision? How could it be organized?
 - o What are the relationships of social protection today? What can they be?

11:00-12:30 3rd Roundtable: "Mobility and the Figure(s) of the '(Im)migrant'"

- <u>Focus</u>: How "the migrant" is constructed in diversified ways and what this means in different social and political contexts
 - o What do we mean by "mobility"? Who is seen to be "mobile," and who is seen as "staying put"?
 - How do people make sense of their position as "migrants" and how are some "migrants" positioned as against other groups of people moving within or across borders?
 - What do cross-border social protections currently look like? How do they work and who do they work for? Do they create their own forms of exploitation? What are the alternatives?

14:00-15:30 4th Roundtable: "Social Protection or Social Solidarity?"

- Introduction and moderation: Nandita Sharma
- Participants: Ebbi Raithelhuber, Stefano Piemontese; Paolo Boccagni; Andreas Herz
- Focus: Developing a distinction between welfare and social protection/social solidarity.
 - o Is social protection a "social welfare service"? Or is it essential for everybody?
 - o What is the basis of social solidarity? Would solidarity be enough? In what forms can it be organized?
 - o What does a form of political community look like that offers social protection for everybody?

16:30-17:30 Open Debate: "How best to bring societal membership, social protection and mobility together?"

- **Focus**: If this world is not designed for any of these things, what kind of world could we imagine that does so? Is it a world of borders? Is it an immobile world? Or is it a No-Border world?

Day 3: Wednesday, September 28th
