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- 31 female students are anticipating the future by living in the future and talking about the past!
- 31 "female" productive texts and drawings carry out the thoughts and feelings of a fictive grandparent generation describing to their grandchildren the life in times of Coronavirus crisis.

This actual assignment in productive writing of a German classroom of an Austrian fourth grade primary lesson gave rise to the idea of inviting schools of primary and secondary education in three or more countries to assign their students exactly the same writing and drawing task.

The created texts and drawings representing a fictive grandparent generation telling their grandchildren about life in times of Corona virus crisis serves as data for social - and educational - scientific research.

By means of systematically combining quantitative and qualitative content analysis of the text corpus obtained in an international context, certain typical narrative and argumentative textual patterns shall be identified, leading to an enhanced understanding of the following social - scientific issues:

- How does a crumbling of the world, using the example of Coronavirus crisis, reflect on a crumbling of infant's orientation in that world during early adolescence?
- What kind of topics are discussed in these speeches?
- What kind of narrations are revealed through textual structures?
- What kind of argumentative patterns in "infant crisis processing" are visible?
- Which understanding of solidarity can be discovered through these texts when it comes to children's imagining different scenarios of intergenerational transmission of life experiences (mobility and immobility, relationship and isolation, danger's invisibility but visibility of the consequences, political message to stand together without standing side by side)


Eleftheria Kladi, 6 years old, 4th Primary School of Kalamata/GR

I didn't like the whole thing at all, and if I could see coronavirus then, i would have killed him in any way I could.




Ariadni Drakopoulou, 8 years old, class 4th Primary School of Kalamata/GR

The deadly virus caught us by surprise then. We separated us from our loved ones for a long time ...




Stavroula Spala, 6 years old, 4th Primary School of Kalamata/GR

If I could turn back time I would chase coronavirus away, so that all children could turn back to schools without masks then ...




Sophia Dimopoulou, 10 years old, 4th Primary School of Kalamata/GR


Ariadne Georgopoulou, 7 years old, 4th Primary School of Kalamata/GR


Angeliki Bei, 9 years old, 1st Pilot Primary School of Alexandroupolis/GR

My life had changed a lot, because we had to wear masks, to keep distance and not to hug anymore. I think this virus was bad and I never want it to come back.




Alexandra Michailidou, 9 years old, 1st Pilot Primary School of Alexandroupolis/GR




Athina Demirakou, 9 years old, 1st Pilot Primary School of Alexandroupolis/GR We put an end to the virus.
