

CURRICULUM VITAE BREVE

Elias Felten, born 1982 in Salzburg Austria, is a Full Professor of Labour Law and Social Security at the Department for Labour and Economic Law at the Paris Lodron University of Salzburg since October 2022. From 2017-2022 he was head of the Department of Labour Law and Social Security Law at the Johannes Kepler University of Linz. From 2015-2019 he was Associate Professor for Labour Law and Social Security Law at the Paris Lodron University of Salzburg. He received the *venia legendi* for labour law and social security law in the year 2015 and his doctorate of law in the year 2009.

He is member of the scientific advisory board of the Max-Planck-Institute for Social Law and Social Policy, appointed member of the steering committee of the Austrian Society of Labour Law and Social Security Law and member of the European Institute for Social Security.

With regard to the field of European Social Security Law he takes part in the EU project "Provision of legal expertise in the field of free movement of workers and social security coordination and dissemination of knowledge in this field – (MoveS)" as national expert of Austria. The MoveS-Network (former FreSsco) is a research network of independent experts, which deals with legal questions in the field of social security coordination and free movement of workers and assists the European Commission in this legal context. He was further more appointed as the national expert for Austria in the European research program "Feasibility and Added Value of a European Unemployment Benefit Scheme" (VT/2014/045) and gave the European Commission in the year 2013 „Specialised assistance in synthesising the issues related to the concept of residence und EU social security legislation" (VT/2013/085). In the field of labour law, he provided for different projects on EU level (e.g. VT/2018/0741) legal analysis on the employment and working conditions of selected types of platform work.

His fields of expertise reach from national and European (especially collective) labour law to trade union rights, anti-discrimination law and Austrian social insurance law to European social security law.
