A serious discussion must start from the reality of threats for European societies and not confuse militarism, which must be rejected, with the defence of a democratic space in which it remains possible to fight against neoliberalism.
Tuesday, 18 November, 18:00- 20:00 online Meeting-Join Microsoft Teams	Adam Hanieh, University of Exeter, UK Multipolar Myths: Imperialism and the Gulf Arab Monarchies at a time of Climate Collapse Since the 2011 Arab uprisings, the Middle East has faced deepening inequality, renewed authoritarianism, and mass displacement. Adam Hanieh situates the Gulf monarchies' oil-fueled rise within shifting oil-centered global capitalism and US–China rivalries, showing how great-power competition reshapes but fails to transform enduring regional domination.

Social movements from below instead call for an “anti-polar” internationalism that rejects both imperialist unipolarity and subimperialist multipolarity, challenging.
